

There are many signs and symbols of joy, and during Easter, certain signs point to the new life of Jesus' resurrection. These are Easter symbols and I would like to mention a few of these:

Butterfly- The caterpillar wraps itself in a cocoon and sees to die. The cocoon breaks open and an enchanting butterfly is out.

Egg: From the outside, the egg seems hard and cold, like a tomb. But it will soon hatch and a new chick will hop out. The chick is a sign of freshness, new life and hope.

Phoenix: The phoenix is a bird from the Middle Eastern



legends. According to the story, there was only one phoenix in the world. Once a year, the phoenix would build her nest and lay one egg. Then the nest would burst into flames and a new phoenix would be born from the ashes. Artists often used the phoenix as a sign of the Risen Lord.

The scandal of the cross which we encounter in our daily lives can be explained only by the miracle of the Transfiguration and above all by the miracle of the Resurrection. The pain and sorrows of our lives make us human, our failures keep us humble but the Resurrection of Jesus keeps us going. It tells us that *cross bearers on earth can become crown bearers in heaven.* And this is what we can look forward to.

May the triumphant Christ rekindle in us the spirit of God's all embracing love and fill the emptiness of our hearts with the Easter Joy. Let us all double up our efforts wherever we are and whatever we do in our mission to create a civilization of love and peace in the midst of violence and hatred. Let's eagerly strive to make a difference in the lives of our people and thus allow them to experience the Risen Lord in their hearts and families.

EASTER JOY

May the peace and joy of the risen Christ be with us all! Very often Christmas and Good Friday get more prominence than Easter but actually for us Christians it is Easter which is the most important event and experience.

Easter is a joyous occasion for us because Jesus our Lord and Saviour has risen from the dead. Jesus conquered death and we celebrate this victory over death. The experience of the twelve disciples, Mother Mary, Mary of Magdalene and many others at the Resurrection was that of deep consolation. This experience transformed the timid Peter, who denied Jesus thrice, to be the 'rock' that Jesus wanted him to be. It transformed the doubting Thomas to proclaim 'My Lord and My God'. This is the experience that inspired and strengthened the disciples and the early church to go out into the world to proclaim the good news even at the cost of their lives. The risen Lord Jesus transcends space and time and so we need to realize that reality is not to be limited to perceptions and information received merely through our five senses. The Risen Lord invites us to look beyond the apparent and see Him and experience Him in every person, in every situation and in creation.

Easter is more a lived experience than an intellectual explanation. We are called to be an Easter people - people of hope and faith in the love of Christ, our risen Lord. The firm foundation of the Christian faith is the empty tomb. Because of Christ's empty tomb, we can be full of hope. Without the Resurrection, Christianity has nothing much to offer to the world. Because Christ lives, death is not a tragedy but a triumph. Our risen Lord strengthens us through the Resurrection experience. He helps us to look beyond suffering and death, helplessness and failure, confusion and distress. Our risen Lord teaches us two important lessons for life: firstly 'Good Friday' will always result in 'Easter Sunday' and secondly 'Easter Sunday' cannot happen without 'Good Friday'. We are hence invited to look at our life experiences especially our difficult, unpleasant or painful experiences with hope, courage, peace and optimism that is signified by Easter. We are an Easter people and so let us open our hearts to our risen Lord that like the two disciples on the way to Emmaus our hearts too may burn experiencing the love and power of our Risen Lord.

We are happy to see that our Institutions especially the newly established ones at Garja, Pakertoli and Jharsuguda are doing well. Our sisters have just opened a hostel for working girls in Jharsuguda. They attend different courses outside and avail of the accommodation in our hostel. As

one goes into the interior places in Pakertoli and Garja in Jharkhand we come across the Tribal Community who are very warm and welcoming, simple and easily approachable. In Pakertoli our sisters have just blessed and inaugurated 2 buildings, one for the dispensary and the other for the boarding.

The Fathers run a primary school and children who stay far away are housed in our boarding and people benefit from the dispensary when they are sick. The Mission at Garja is slowly coming up. Here the sisters have to adjust themselves staying in a small house till the Convent is built. A boarding building too is coming up.

Everywhere where there are boardings we could see that our sisters take keen interest in looking after the boarding girls with motherly affection. These girls are given timely instructions in etiquette, health and hygiene. Good values too are imparted to them.

Travelling towards the South one could experience freshness and greenery all around. The school at Hidkal Dam is a CBSE one and has really picked up in numbers and quality education. Our school in Kannur though not belonging to us, our sisters work might and main to bring up the school and to achieve good results. In the other mission stations that we visited our sisters besides teaching the K.G. children have also engaged themselves in Social,

Pastoral and Catechetical work. The tiny tots entertained us with their song and dance.

It has been a joyful experience visiting our sister in their work places. This has definitely brought us closer to each other and to the Province. Community spirit is being kept alive through prayer, penance and great sacrifices to face the challenges of daily life.Let us continue to accompany our sisters through our prayers. May the Charism of our Foundress Mother Anne be expressed in all that we do and are. As we send positive energy from the strong power house- Jesus, let us remain centered, focussed and oriented to achieve our goal.





St. Patrick Patron of Pune Diocese

St. Patrick is known as the Apostle of Ireland. He was not act ually Irish. His exact birthplace and date is not known. However it is believed that he was born round 375 AD. His parents were Calpurnius and Conchessa who were Romans living in Britain in charge of the colonies. They were close relatives of Martin of Tours. His real name is believed to be Maewyn Succat and he took on the name Patrick upon becoming a priest.

Early Life: When Patrick was 16 years old, he was captured by Irish pirates. They brought him to Ireland where he was sold into slavery in Dalriada. There his job was to tend sheep. It was hard life as he was denied the 3 basic needs food, shelter and clothing. This painful experience of his life made him to reflect on the Crucifixtion of our Lord.Patrick came to view his enslavement as God's test of his faith. During his six years of captivity, he became fluent in the Irish language and became deeply devoted to Christianity through constant prayer. In a vision, he saw the children of pagan Ireland reaching out their hands to him and grew increasingly determined to convert the Irish to Christianity. He escaped after having a dream sent from God in which he was told to leave Ireland by going to the coast where he would find a ship waiting to sail to Britain. After three days of sailing, he and the crew abandoned the vessel in France and wandered and got lost for 28 days- covering 200 miles of territory. He is believed to have met up with his parents in Wales before travelling to France where he became a priest.

A free man once again, Patrick went to Auxerre, France, where he studied for priesthood under the guidance of the missionary St. Germain. He was ordained a deacon by the Bishop of Auxerre around 418 A.D. As time passed, he never lost sight of his vision to convert Ireland to Christianity. In 432 A.D., he was ordained as a bishop and was soon sent by Pope Celestine I to Ireland to spread the gospel to non-believers while also providing support to the small community of Christians already living there. He travelled throughout Ireland, preaching the Gospel and converting many. He and his disciples preached and converted thousands and began building churches all over the country. Ireland was converted to Christianity in 432 AD.

St. Patrick's ministry covered a period of 60 years. He established 365 churches and a school arose beside each church. He continued until his death, to visit and watch over the churches which he had established. He comforted the faithful in their difficulties strengthened them in the faith and in the practice of virtue. His mission in Ireland



lasted for 30 years. It was by him that many cells, monasteries, and churches were erected throughout Ireland. It was by him that bishops, priests, and persons of every dignity were ordained. He worked so many miracles and wonders, that the human mind is incapable of remembering or recording the amount of good which he did upon earth. When the time of St. Patrick's death approached, he received the Body of Christ from the hands of the holy Bishop Tassach, in the 122nd year of his age, and resigned his spirit to heaven.

He tells us in his confessions: "To turn to God let us not wait for trials to come our way but let us thank God for each day by fulfilling my mission of love touching the lives of poor and needy."

There is much debate over when and where he died. It is believed he died on 17 March, 460 at Saul, Downpatrick. That is why Saint Patrick's day is celebrated on March 17th. Some people suggest he was also born on 17 March.

The clans of Ireland began to bicker over who should receive the honour of having his final resting-place on their land. To avoid this sacrilegious end to his life his friends secreted away his body to bury in a secret grave. Many believe this to be in Downpatrick, County Down, where there is a permanent memorial.

Global News Embarking on a New Mission



On 10th Oct. 2017 Sr. Arpita and myself bade farewell to our sisters in India and started our journey to Brig Switzerland. We were warmly welcomed at the airport by Sr. Nicole, Sr. Pushpa and Sr. Judith. A three hours drive by car brought us to our Convent in Brig where our sisters were joyously waiting to welcome us. Sr. Alka welcomed us in the traditional way by an Arathi. We had mixed feelings of joy, anxiety and gratitude.

Already on the 2nd day of our arrival we were blessed to make a trip to Dole, France, where our Foundress Mother Anne began the Congregation. Sr. Nicole drove us along with Sr. Pushpa and we all had a very pleasant experience. We were fortunate to stay with our Federation Sisters in Fribourg for 2 days. We went around seeing the places



closely associated to us, where Mother Anne lived, prayed, walked, struggled and even wept for a noble cause and a greater mission. It was an emotional moment for us which strengthened our love and admiration for our dear Foundress.

After we returned from Dole, we started German classes. Sr. Siegrun and Sr. Christophora were blessed with patience to pace up with our speed of learning German. We were not given any responsibility so that we could dedicate entirely for mastering the language.

Sr. Alka was already deeply immersed in her work in the infirmary. She is quite at ease with the language and the routine. Our sisters were concerned that we pick up the language to converse with them, get acquainted with the culture, tradition and places around. So we were provided with many opportunities to mingle with people by attending Youth convention, prayer meetings, Bible sharing etc. in our parish as well as nearby parishes.

A month later, we changed from the sari to skirt and blouse. One of the difficulties is to communicate freely with the Sisters. I found it hard to manage with limited words and to make myself understood. Despite my great zeal for the mission I feel helpless at times.... It is difficult to give up where one is well rooted and accepted, knows what to do and how to do Then to go to a land you do not know exactly what? Like Abraham or Mother Anne, one has to let go of the dreams for a mission of one's choice. By perpetual struggle, complete detachment, the continuous sacrifice of one's will through total surrender to reach the goal God (Mission) like a flame which rises towards heaven.

On 9th Jan 2018, both of us were shifted to Jorden Heim, Visp. It is a Pastoral Centre run by the Diocese of Sitten. A good number of our sisters have served this institute and Sr. Sabina is still there. At the moment we are helping out wherever needed and gradually will take up the responsibility.

I am presently surprised and impressed, to witness the good will, charity and sisterly love practised in the Convent

at Brig especially towards the helplessness of the older sisters, their love and devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and their spirit of prayer.

As I conclude I would like to say that in all our initial struggles what kept us cheerful was the support, love and understanding from the sisters here. They were very sensitive to our needs, sometimes went out of their way to make us feel comfortable. Sr. Nicole having a great responsibility of the aging sisters, kept



aside a little corner for us younger ones, and made us feel 'at home'.

I take this opportunity to thank Sr.Rita and all of you dear sisters for your valuable prayers and support. We are grateful to you and hold you closely in our prayers

Activities at St. Joseph's Chandavar 2017 - 2018

As we look back to this year of our mission at Chandavar, we feel wonder, surprise and grateful to God for all that he has done in and through us. First and foremost we are grateful to our Society for the generosity and openness towards the mission at Chandavar.



The new KG building was blessed and inaugurated in the month of June by Sr.Marina. 47 children are registered in our K.G classes which we run daily from 9.15 am to 12.45pm.

In the afternoon we have free tailoring classes for women taught by an efficient teacher. These classes are from 2.30pm to 5.00pm,and is run by local trust. In the first batch we have 27 women and soon this batch is ending in April. We hope to begin the second batch. At the end of their 6 months course they will be given a certificate.

We also have begun the computer classes in February from 5.00pm to 6.30pm These daily computer classes are for college students , school going students in different batches, who avail themselves of this facility. We have 32 students. Inspite of their studies and exams, they are





regular in attending the computer classes. They too will be awarded the ISO certificate after completing their courses. Along with these different activities, pastoral ministry is also our main mission here. This year we are active in social and pastoral work. Due to lack of language we could not teach Catechism but this year our parish priest requested us to take Catechism for the First Communion children and we were happy to take up this noble work. We are engaged with the women's league, children's club, PPC and visiting the families especially poor, sick and the needy. We involve ourselves in giving classes to the parents and godparents of newly born babies. Sometimes also preparing young couples to get married. Since our parish is a pilgrim centre we are fully involved in church activities. This year we were



also given the opportunity to prepare the entire parish for confession in groups. In each group 20 people for about 2hours daily during this lenten season. It really was a wonderful experience, so satisfying and fulfilling.

We are grateful to God for using us as His instruments for His glory and honor, to carry the little lamp which was lit by our foundress M.Anne. May our Foundress M.Anne continue to intercede for us and for our mission.

Report of the Activities conducted in Asha Sadan Centre Andheri Mumbai.

Since 2005 we were working in collaboration with the SVD's. From August 2017 we have begun a search for relevant social ministries on our own. After having prayed over and discerned the will of God, we began exploring

ways and means.

We decided to take up the new cases of HIV infected and affected in Mumbai. At the moment, we have 32 families who are registered under our care. We invite them once a month to Canossa School hall, conduct sessions for them, listen to them and then distribute a nutrition kit worth Rs. 500/-, such as dal, pulses, dates, groundnuts, lapsy, jaggery etc.



We have two balwadis in the slums, where around 50 children come to us. We run these balwadis in the temples. We have appointed two teachers and pay them. The

children are in the age group from 3 to 5 years.

We have begun collaborating with an Organization working for Vitamin Angels, ie. reaching out to pregnant women and children up to 5 years of age, who lack vitamin A and Multivitamin during these particular years. Every six months the tablets will be given to children, the records maintained, till the child reaches five years of age. For this



we need to conduct a survey and do the needful.

We also work part time for the Archdiocese of Mumbai Social Centre, conducting **Preventive Health**, sessions for the women in the slums. In future we intend to reach out to many more. The Director of this Centre sponsors partly for the nutrition of the HIV families, and many more generous people who come to know about our activities support us either by their presence, prayers or financial support.

Future Plans: We intend to reach out to many more Infected and Affected families with HIV, support classes, Counselling twice a week for half day to Canossa school children, as they have requested.

Dear Sisters we need your prayerful support as we move further in our mission in Mumbai and are also looking out for a place to do all our planned activities. May we commit ourselves to reach out to the least of the Society.
