Snippets of Ignatian Spirituality

'Roots and wings' is a month long program on spirituality of St. Ignatius. Sr. Elizabeth and I were privileged to attend it. The program was divided into four weeks, including a retreat on Ignatian spirituality.

The Cardoner Vision : In 1522 long after his conversion , Ignatius sat praying on the bank of the Cardoner River near the village of Manresa in Northern Spain. In his autobiography, he describes an extraordinary vision. While he was seated there, the eyes of his understanding began to be opened; though he did not see any vision, he understood and knew many things, both spiritual things and matters of faith and learning., and this was with so great an enlightenment that everything seemed new to him. It was as if he were a new man with a new intellect.

The cardoner experience for Ignatius is that everything comes from God and

everything is going back to God. And that is the purpose of my life and of every person. Our mission is to help each person to attain the purpose of their lives and to join Christ in taking the whole creation back to God.

The Saint I admire and who inspires me the most-Saint Teresa of Avila

"Christ has no body now but mine" Teresa of Avila


Teresa was born on 28th March 1515. She was the daughter of Alonso and Beatriz De Ahumada. When his wife died he re-married leaving behind two children. From the second marriage he had ten children of whom Teresa was the third

Since there were no public schools in Spain at that time, Teresa received a rudimentary education at home until she was sixteen. After that her father Alonso entrusted his daughter's further education to the Augustinian nuns of Our Lady of Grace in Avila. In time Teresa began to consider the possibility of a religious vocation, but initially her father refused. So on 2nd November 1535 she 'ran away from home' to enter the Carmelite Monastery of the incarnation in Avila. Later her father acceded to her wishes and even provided a generous dowry for her entrance. Thus, began her life in the Carmelite Order as Sister Teresa of Jesus.


1536-1538 After her vows in 1537, Teresa's early religious life is marked by an intense fervor for perfection and prayer. Her life and works deal with



spiritual and mystical graces received by her. The way of perfection describes the way of life leading to union with God. The Interior Castle within, wherein the King of glory dwells in greatest splendor and there the very secret exchanges between God and the soul takes place. There possibilities of practical insight into the graced workings of God within the spiritual life grows as we seek knowledge of God. We grow in self-knowledge which deepens our knowledge of God and the



distinction between God and we His creatures. Self knowledge and God knowledge are never ending. The clearer we see and know who God is and who we are the deeper will be our humility, our awareness and dependence on God for all things. Thus self- knowledge is intrinsically bound to humility. That is why our own foundress Mother Anne, after experiencing and living it in her own life, thrust into her novices the importance of having humility as they grow in religious life. Our dignity and capacity as human beings are reflections of God's presence and activity within us, also of God's beauty and majesty and splendor. It is always present in the soul and nothing can take away its loveliness. The soul longs not to offend His majesty, even guarding oneself against venial sins. Such a soul is fond of doing penance and setting aside periods of recollections, silence and balanced in the use of speech, becoming more organized in dealing with everyday life. One becomes aware of one's weaknesses and limitations, yet one sees that there is a direction, a movement in what we are doing and have achieved a level of integration in the

The provision was made public in Rome on March 25, 2023. The press office of the Vatican on its website stated, "The Holy Father has accepted the resignation from the pastoral care of the diocese of Poona, India, presented by Bishop Thomas Dabre. The Holy Father has

appointed Bishop John Rodrigues, hitherto titular bishop of Deulto and auxiliary of Bombay, India, as bishop of the diocese of Poona, India."
