

EDITORIAL Sailing into 2020

We have stepped into a new decade beginning with the New Year. We wonder what this new year will bring to us in all the spheres of our livesphysical, psychological, spiritual etc... We surely have begun on a very optimistic note as we have placed our hand in the Hand of the Almighty trusting Him to take us safely along this year.

To help us on our journey I offer you some reflections that might help you as you face each day of this wonderful year. Shall we call them our resolutions?????

Pope Francis has enlisted his list for all of us. Let's reflect on a few:

- **1. Don't gossip:** It's one of the most evil activities' denouncing it as "murder" The Pope says that when we gossip, "we are doing what Judas did," and "begin to tear the person to pieces".
- 2. Make Time for Others: Don't pretend you are too busy. Pope Francis in his busy schedule took time once to send a handwritten letter to a Jesuit he had never met. The Jesuit says" If the Pope can find time to be kind to others, if he can pause to say thank you and appreciate someone so can you and me".
- 3. Choose the more humble Purchase: The Pope preaches against materialism. "Certainly, possessions, money, and power can give a momentary thrill, the illusion of being happy, but they end up possessing us and making us always want to have more." In connection with this point I would like to say a lot of us are carrying a little too much junk in the trunk. We need to "strip off" that extra weight. The writer of the letter to the Hebrews tells us: Let us strip off very weight that slows us down, especially the sin that so easily trips us up. And let us run with endurance the race God has set up before us". (Hebrews 12:1)

Change needs us to strip off the extra weight and that looks a lot like surrender. You unload unnecessary baggage and move forward with the best. You discard what isn't yours to carry so you can hang on to what is.



So let us strip off every weight that slows us down: our sin, our pride, our false ego, our need for approval, our badge of busyness, our belief that it's all in our hands. And then we can rise up with endurance to run the race God has set before us.

- **4. Befriend those who disagree:** "When leaders in various fields ask me for advice, my response is always the same: *dialogue*, *dialogue*, *dialogue*. It is the only way for individuals, families, communities and societies to grow. Others always have something to give me, if we know how to approach them in a spirit of openness and without prejudice".
- **5. Be Happy:** The true Christian, says the Pope, exudes great joy. He says keeping this joy to ourselves "will make us sick in the end. Sometimes these melancholy Christians' faces have more in common with pickled peppers than the joy of having a beautiful life". Francis says, "The Christian sings with joy, and walks, and carries this joy". This joy, he reminds us, should translate to love of neighbor.

Ignatian Spirituality is one of the important Spiritualities that the teachings of the Church is based on. It consists of two pillars. The first is an experience and reflection whose end is praise and reverence. The second pillar is spiritual conversation where graces are multiplied when the experience is shared. We were given to reflect and deepen our spirituality through the exercises of St. Ignatius and through

which we were inspired and enriched to live a life of dedication and commitment namely:

- _God's greater glory
- _ Union with Jesus
- _Self awareness
- Spiritual direction
- _ Detachment
- _ Finding God in all things
- Discernment
- Effective love
- Service in humility

The Saint who inspires me

St. John Bosco popularly known as the 'Saint of Youth' was born to poor parents in Italy on 16th August 1815. His feast is celebrated on 31st January the day of his death. He was a priest and educator and the founder of the Salesian priests and sisters.

At the age of nine, the young Bosco had a dream which would later bring about a turning point in his life. He dreamt that he was in a field with a crowd of children who were fighting with each other. Bosco jumped into their midst and started to stop them. Suddenly a man radiant with light appeared in a white flowing mantle. He said to him," You will have to win these friends of yours, not with blows but with gentleness and kindness. Bosco argued saying that he was just a boy, so how could he be ordered to do something impossible. The man replied, "What seems impossible, you must achieve by being obedient and gaining knowledge". John's life changed and he grew in humility, faithfulness and strength. This first dream led him to minister to the poor and the neglected boys, visiting prisons and the abandoned. He believed education to be a matter of the heart and said that the boys must not only be



loved but that they are loved. He placed his work under the protection of St. Francis de Sales and our Lady Help of Christians as patroness.

What can we learn from this great saint John Bosco who discovered his vocation in the upliftment of young boys. Let us take inspiration to work hard with joy and hope, to venture into new avenues and to take risks. Above all let us cultivate a deep interior life of prayer. May St. John Bosco help us in all our undertakings.


