Year of Prayer - 2024



Pope Francis has declared 2024 as the Year of Prayer, in preparation for the Jubilee of 2025 with the theme, "Pilgrims of Hope". To hope it is necessary to pray: it is certainly not something vague or abstract. Praying is an act

of the whole person, body, soul and spirit. The Holy Father has announced that 2025 will be a Jubilee Year, something which happens every 25 years, and it will be a year of hope for a world suffering the impacts of war, the ongoing effects of COVID-19 pandemic, and the climate crisis.

This period aims to spiritually ready the faithful for the Jubilee, fostering a deeper connection with God through prayer and reflection. The Church encourages the faithful to engage in various forms of prayer, including personal devotion, communal worship, and Eucharistic adoration, emphasizing the importance of hope in the Christian journey.

The Year of Prayer seeks to rejuvenate the spiritual life of individuals and communities, inspiring a renewed commitment to faith and service. It serves as a reminder that prayer is a powerful tool for seeking divine guidance, fostering unity, and cultivating a hopeful outlook amid life's challenges. But we may ask: What exactly is Prayer?

Prayer is just that, a deep communion with God- we talking to God expressing our heart to God and God revealing his heart to us. It is a two-way heart to heart loving communication that nourishes our faith. Pope Francis said," The Year of Prayer, fits into this context as a way of fostering our relationship with the Lord, offering moments of genuine spiritual rest. This year 2023-2024 all the three of us- Sr. Maria, Sr. Fatima and Sr. Marium were new to the community. The Parish Priest and the parishioners welcomed us warmly.

Activities:

- a) Pre-Primary School: This is the 6th year of our Preprimary school. This year 55 students were enrolled in Nursery, Junior KG and Senior KG. The parents were very happy for the academic performance of their children. This year we had the Annual Day program. Parents and people around the village appreciated our effort in moulding the little kids.
- b) Tuition classes for the village children: As every year this year too we had tuition classes for the children in the village. There was a good response from children in the beginning. The attendance of the children was not regular, that was a bit discouraging.
- c) Spoken English Classes for adults and students: Sr. Fatima was taking these classes. Many young boys and girls and even married people came for the spoken English classes. They all were happy and benefitted a lot. Some of them even passed in the interviews and got good jobs. Feel happy and satisfied that they can learn to speak English well.
- d) Teaching English in Government school (Part time): Sr. Fatima went to the government school to teach English to the students. The parents of that school were very happy that their children though being in Kannada medium can learn to read,

write and speak in English. We were also happy that we could share our knowledge and experience with the deprived children and instill in them good values.

Pastoral Ministry:

1) Sacristy Work

Sr. Marium was in charge and she did her best and worked tirelessly.

2) Teaching Catechism:

It is one of the most loved apostolate in our parish. Sr. Fatima was taking catechism for middle school children. Along with other catechism teachers we had many activities for our catholic children like Children's day, Girl- child day and Catechism day, Christmas celebration and fun fair during the Church annual feast were the activities through which we could instil in the children the gospel values and an ardent desire and love for scripture.

3) Women's league:

Sr. Maria was in charge of the women's league. Every month meaningful meetings were conducted. This was a wonderful occasion to give some input sessions for the women who are most of the time dedicated their time and energy only to earn and take care of their families. Often Sr. Maria, taught them about, hygiene, happy home building, and how to be a good mother and bring up their children in Christian faith.

Women's Celebration in the Parish:

Sr. Maria is also appointed as the coordinator of women's league of the Kumta Deanery. She actively organized programs like women's day, deanery level pilgrimage program in our parish etc. It was well appreciated and loved by many women of our Kumta deanery. Visits to the sick and praying for them was a meaningful time spent together by all the women of our parish. It was a kind of sharing in their pain and sufferings, and also accompanying them in their sorrow and pain of losing their dear ones.

Sr. Maria as coordinator along with the diocesan women Commission and the Secretary of women's commission gathered the widows of three deaneries and organized a day's program for the first time in the diocese in



Honnavar at Prathibohya. It was a day to uplift the widows and give them a place of honor and acceptance. The program was a great success. An input session was given to appreciate them and strengthen them. Entertainment programs were conducted that made the day a happy one for them.

4) Children's Club:

Along with the Assistant parish priest, Sr. Marium and Sr. Fatima together conducted many lively activities for the children. Monthly meetings were conducted regularly which encouraged the children to imbibe the values of our faith.

5) Visiting Families:

Sr. Maria and Sr. Fathima regularly visited the families. Sr. Maria took keen interest in visiting families not only in our parish but and all our substations, around 18 villages. It was a time of sharing

faith and love with the people.

Other activities:

Besides our various apostolates we also took time to strengthen our vocation and nourished our spiritual life. We had a meaningful and strengthening gathering of our three closer communities (Kargal, Magundi and Kadabugare), where we could share our rich experiences and encouraged one another and learnt something for our mission in our parishes.

Conclusion:

We are ever grateful to God, Sr. Marina and the team for placing us together as a community which was an enriching experience for us. And also grateful for their generosity in providing all the necessary things! Praise God for this!!! We loved what we did and we had faith in God, in one another and in ourselves.

Taking care of the Old in the Evening of their Lives

"Truly I tell you, Just as you did it to one of these members of my family, you did it to me." (Matthew 25:40).

All of us are members of the Universal family. We belong to God alone. We come from God, we live in God, and we return to God. On this journey, life takes its turns and twists as we continue our journey on this planet. In this fast-moving world with various occupations, we do not notice that the "evening of life" has arrived at our doorstep. This reality has been expressed by many of

the inmates of St. Mary's old age home. For me personally, it's a very painful experience for an individual to leave their own family, home, and get rooted in an unknown place and begin all over anew. Already, the person has struggled and worked hard as a youth in the past, faced the departure of loved ones, and now in the evening of life, to face rejection from kith and kin is not easy at all.

Most of the inmates are from Goa, and

some of them are from Mumbai and Pune. 80% of the children want to keep their parents with caretakers or in an old age home. Personally, I have seen and experienced women who silently cry for their children and grandchildren.

This vacuum no one is able to fill, however, we provide the best facilities. As our foundress Venerable Mother Anne gave the highest priority to education for girls and women, we put ourselves at their service and give preference to the poor, sick, needy, widows, and spinsters. We have a number of childless widows. Few of them were cheated by their own family members for property and money. This is challenging work where we drain our energy. Sometimes we get soaked with pain, sorrows, and the negativity that can creep in. Therefore, we need to keep ourselves updated, centered, connected, and focused on our Lord and Master Jesus Christ.



My close observation of the transition from this life to the other life, as I have witnessed in many cases, is as follows: In the beginning, there is a lot of aggressiveness, anger, restlessness, defense, and a fight with God asking, "Why me?" The body becomes rigid, dry, stiff, with no cooperation from the self. The moment a person surrenders and total forgiveness takes place, the person becomes gracious. It's so very pleasant to

look after this person. We accompany the person until the end as we pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet or the prayer to St. Joseph. Since the rosary is available on YouTube, we continuously use this prayer form. As the time approaches, the person becomes restless, but as they surrender the spirit, a glow appears, and the face becomes shining and serene because the radiant light of Jesus Christ shines upon them.

Our Manipuri Children On Holiday

29thMay we had the visit of our Manipuri girls who stay with our sisters at Jharsuguda. They all go to school there and these days being holidays Sr Mercian brought them all to Pune fora holiday. They were 25 girls who were accompanied by Sr. Mercian, a teacher and a lady to cook for them.

On 1st June we arranged a session for them by Mr Shirish. He along with three girls came as a team and conducted different self-help sessions for them helping them to develop a positive attitude towards themselves and each other. The team shared their testimonies of how they found Jesus as their best friend. At the end of the day they were divided into three groups and each group had to present their learnings of the day through creative drawings. The girls thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

Later on they visited our sisters in the three communities at Chinchwad. They enjoyed themselves at the water park and other places of interest.

On 2nd June they travelled to Ratnagiri to visit our sisters there. There too they had a hilarious time especially at the beach. Sr Valery organized some sessions for them by two sdb priests. The highlights of the sessions were talks, games, and sing-song. Through the symbol of a broken and empty pot, the animators helped them to see how at times they too feel empty and broken especially now without their parents and loved ones. A story was narrated of a broken cup of a king and how it was mended by carving beautiful designs on it. Like this story their lives too can be mended by living and caring for each other. Their broken pots can be mended by the Great Mender- Jesus. nother session was taken by the parish priest of Ratnagiri. The highlights of the talk:

- 1. Everyone has some difficulties in life.
- 2. Faith and hope are important.
- 3. There is a reaction to every action.
- 4. Never under estimate the strength of a woman.

Fr also taught them songs and dance. Sr Valery too had a session with them. She shared her experiences and the difficulties she faced in school. She also guided them as to how to memorise and study different subjects. Happiness is when we make others happy by doing good to them. Living our lives not only for self but for others.

They then visited our sisters at Rosary Cottage and St Ursula- Varawade. They returned to Shanti Ashram 8th morning having thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

On 9th June they visited some of the neighbouring seminaries. Fr. Rajesh the parish priest of Christ the King Parish served them a sumptuous meal. That evening we had recreation together. The girls danced and spoke words of gratitude and appreciation. Our Junior sisters and novices too entertained them with a dance. We then had a power-point presentation on our Congregation. A surprise item by way of gifts were given to them.



10th June was a visit to the science park, planetarium and a 3d movie brought them much joy and happiness. In the evening they attended the Parish Mass. Fr Alfred the parish priest then entertained them with games and dinner.

As all good things come to an end so too the visit of our Manipuri friends. They said good bye to us on 11th June

and started their journey back home to Jharsuguda feeling sad to leave us yet happy and grateful for the memorable holiday they had.

Looking back on the days spent with our girls, we have learnt much. Inspite of the pain of leaving their parents behind and knowing the problems they face with the war still going on in Manipur, these girls have alot of resilience to move forward in life. They have been so full of life and a happy lot taking everything in their stride. Their faith in God is strong as could be seen in their loud participation at Mass. Always cheerful, always happy it has been a joy to have them around. They indeed brought life to our communities. We pray that God may always take care of them and their loved ones.

Self - Discovery Through Enneagram



Rev. Fr. Tony, a Jesuit priest belonging to Patna Province took seventeen of us Juniors on an Enneagram expedition, helping us to delve deep into ourselves to find the treasures therein. This journey lasted from 10th to 21st April 2024.

The exercise began by reflecting on 180 statements on self and we were asked to encircle the ones we believed is true of ourselves. After totalling the numbers we were able to get a specific number. Here in brief are the different numbers and it's nature.

Personality Style 1:- The Good Person

The key motivation is to be right, to strive higher and improve others, to justify my own position, to be beyond criticism so as not be condemned by anyone.

Personality Style 2:- The Helpful Person

Key motivation is to be loved, to express feelings for others, to be needed and appreciated, to coerce others into responding to them to vindicate claims about self.

Personality Style 3:- The successful person.

The key motive to be affirmed, to distinguish self from others, to receive attention, to be admired, to impress others.

Personality Style 4:- The Unique Person.

The key motive is to understand themselves, to express self in something beautiful, to withdraw to protect their feelings, to take care of emotional need before attending to anything else.

Personality Style 5:- The Wise Person.

The key motivation is to understand the environment,

to interpret everything as a way to defend the self from threats from the environment.

Personality Style 6:- The Faithful Person.

The key motivation is to be secure, to be liked and have approval of others, to test attitudes of others toward them, to fight against anxiety and insecurity.

Personality Style 7:- The Joyful Person.

The key motive is to be happy, to have fun and amuse themselves, to escape anxiety and to do and have more of everything.

Personality Style 8:- The Powerful Person.

The key motive is to be self reliant, to act from self interest, to have impact on environment, to prevail over others.

Personality Style 9:- The Peaceful Person.

The key motive is to experience union with others, to preserve things as they are to avoid conflict and tension, to ignore whatever would upset them to preserve their peace at any cost.

We were indeed so privileged to attend this class which helped us to discover the multiple graces and talents the Lord has blessed each of us with..lt enabled us to accept all our strengths and limitations...We believe that it will help us to understand oneself and others as well.
