EDITORIAL Misercordia Et Misera (Mercy with Misery)


In *Misericordia et Misera,* the apostolic letter released on November 21st 2016, Pope Francis wrote, "The Catholic Church's focus on God's mercy must continue with individual acts of kindness, assistance to the poor and particularly, encouraging Catholics to participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and making it easier for them to do so."

MISERICORDIA ET MISERA is a phrase used by St. Augustine in narrating the story of Jesus' encounter with the woman taken in adultery (cf. *Jn* 8: 1-11). A very beautiful and apt way of expressing the mystery of God's love when it touches the sinner: "the two of them alone remained: *mercy with misery*". What great mercy and divine justice shine forth in this touching narrative! Its teaching serves



not only to throw light on the conclusion of the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy 20th Nov. 2016 but also to point out the path that we are called to follow in the future. The Holy Year of Mercy was indeed a time rich in mercy and which must continue to be celebrated and lived out in our communities parishes and in the world at large.

A woman and Jesus meet. She is an adulteress and, in the eyes of the Law, liable to be stoned. Jesus, through his preaching and the total gift of himself that would lead him to the Cross, returned the Mosaic Law to its true and original intent. What is central here is not the law or legal justice, but the love of God, which is capable of looking into the heart of each person and seeing the deepest desire hidden there; God's love must take primacy over all else. The Gospel account, however, is not an encounter of sin and judgement in the abstract, but of a sinner and her



Saviour. Jesus looked that woman in the eye and read in her heart a desire to be understood, forgiven and set free. The misery of sin was clothed with the mercy of love. Jesus' only judgement is one filled with mercy and compassion for the condition of this sinner. Jesus replies with a lengthy silence to those who wished to judge and condemn her to death. His purpose in doing this was to let God's voice be heard in the conscience not only of the woman, but also in those of her accusers, who drop their stones and one by one leave the scene (cf. Jn 8:9). Jesus then says: "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?.... Neither do I condemn you. Go your way and from now on do not sin again". Jesus helps the woman to look to the future with hope and to make a new start in life. Once clothed in mercy, even if the inclination to sin remains, it is overcome by the love that makes it possible for her to look ahead and to live her life differently.

In conclusion, "Mercy is a force that overcomes everything, filling our hearts with love and bringing consolation through pardon". (Pope Francis)

Let us recall our reflections, decisions and all that we have done in the 'Year of Mercy' being more compassionate, forgiving and merciful towards the members of our community, in the apostolate and especially towards the poor and the downtrodden. Let us not stop with the ending of the 'Year of Mercy' but let our merciful hearts continue beating with the merciful and compassionate heart of Jesus that will never stop beating. Let us continue to keep the 'doors of mercy' of our hearts open for all those who enter therein.



The season of Lent is here again reminding all of us of God's abounding love for the humankind. However when we hear the word Lent what comes to our minds at once is fasting, penance, sacrifices, giving up and many other things which we do not long for. As we all know all these are

external factors. Do we concentrate on what is inside us which no one can see but God alone- our inner selves?

If all our external piety will make us only self righteous and not make us more loving and compassionate it is meaningless before God. If they are carried out with a good purpose they will automatically make us better persons for nothing great can be achieved without the struggle- some giving up, some tedious effort or sacrifices.

Lent is a time to convince ourselves that there is always a way to make things good again especially those whom we hurt or those who have hurt us for to say I am 'sorry' it requires courage and it takes a big man/woman to be able to forgive. 
Provincial Chapter- 4th February 2017 at Shanti Ashram- 85 Sisters Participated

Psycho-Spiritual Rejuvenation My Experiences at Ryshivana



The Sabatical Year 2016-2017 has been gifted to me by God and my Society. It has been a year of renewal, inner healing and being rejuvenated in body, mind and spirit.

'Ryshivana' in its scenic beauty situated on the 'lap of Mother Earth' speaks volumes of God's infinite love

and goodness; enabling one to live in harmony with oneself, others and creation itself. Many were the topics dealt with as I journeyed each day along with my companions at Ryshivana. What I would like to share with you is the 'Journey of Prayer' that we were invited to walk through namely:

1. Vocal Prayer 2. Discursive Prayer 3. Active Prayer 4. Passive Prayer 5. The Dark night of the Senses 6. The Dark night of the Spirit 7. Spiritual Bethrothal & Marriage.

* <u>In Vocal prayer</u> we are taken back into our childhood days where we learnt the Lord's Prayer and other prayers at home and in our Catechism classes. As one grows in the higher stages of prayer, even vocal prayer becomes meaningful and a means of communion with God.

* <u>In Discursive prayer</u> the mind is active. Meditating on the Word of God it definitely helps us to communicate with God.

* <u>Active prayer</u> keeps us focussed on some truths of Godeg. Goodness, Faithfulness, Love, Mercy etc. This type of prayer can be compared to a child whose father is abroad and the child has not yet seen him. But the father regularly sends gifts and communicates with his child over the phone. The child has not yet experienced the father in person, only can imagine the qualities of his dear father. In Active prayer one has not yet deeply experienced Godonly focussed on His qualities. My effort and God's Grace. * <u>Passive prayer</u> is being consciously aware of the loving presence of God. This is the work of God. One sees Him present in persons, creation, the Eucharist, anytime and everywhere. Here the person experiences God without his/her effort. It's entirely the work of God. Intellect and memory are not involved. It's like the child who gets the message that his father is coming home. He longs for him and when he comes, he becomes one with him in a loving embrace.

* <u>The Dark Night of the Senses</u> is bypassed by the one who has gone through the passive stage of prayer. In the dark night of the senses one experiences dryness in prayer and a deep sense of her/his misery and sinfulness. Pride, self-gratification and self-righteousness creeps in, making the person weak in love and incapable of a deeper communication with God and others.

* When a person goes through the dark night of the soul, purification takes place. Soul and Spirit are involved. One struggles long sickness, misunderstanding, death of a loved one etc. However the person going through this stage experiences union with God and a powerful communication with God. Mother Anne and the saints have gone through this stage. They rarely enjoyed good health, an easy life, experienced etc. but they were attuned and one with God as they gazed into eternity.

* <u>Spiritual Bethrothal and Spiritual Marriage</u> is the stage where one triumphantly comes out of the dark night of the soul. The person lets go off everything and surrenders totally to God. Thus a spiritual marriage takes place where soul and Christ are one. (Gal.2/20) Eg. of a dry log- it burns into a red hot amber. A similar transformation takes place in the soul. As the 'divine' fire of love consumes the soul, love transforms the soul into God through participation in the fire of love. It's the stage of a re-birth of the soul.
